Today is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week and the end of our Lenten journey with Jesus to Jerusalem.

In "The Last Week": What the Gospels Really Teach About Jesus's Final Days in Jerusalem, Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan speak of the palm parade as a social commentary on the big pompous fan- fares that powers and principalities would use to enter a city. The parade could be seen as a protest. At the start of Passover, Jesus rides into the city of Jerusalem on a borrowed donkey. Large crowds gather around and follow him. People spread cloaks on the road; others spread leafy branches cut from the fields.

While this was a seemingly simple procession, it could also be a challenge to political power. At the same time Jesus was entering the city of Jerusalem by one gate, Pilate was entering from another gate in another part of the city. Pilate's procession was a striking display of state and military power. He entered with warhorses and Roman soldiers. Pilate's powerful entry would have served to remind people who had gathered from far and wide to maintain order, and to obey their current ruling authority. Don't even think about protesting! Pilate's processional was a manifestation of empire. Jesus' processional, by contrast, was a simple one where he rode a donkey. The people shouted "Hosanna," which means "save us." The crowds with Jesus were not people who traditionally held power in society. They were part of a peripheral religious group that was led by an unusual leader.

One way of describing this processional is as a counter-protest that resisted the status quo.

Across the world in Myanmar, Thailand, Hong Kong, the United States and some European nations, we have seen a surge in protest marches. As you view these events from the comfort of your living room, what do you make of the protestors?

What might the Roman garrison leaders have made of the man on the donkey being heralded in by a group of protestors?

What would stir you to be part of a protest march?

A sombre worship experience that follows Jesus from his arrest to his death on the Cross. Our choir will present a song and Rev Tony Eldridge will bring the Good Friday reflection.

Easter Sunday 9.30am "Look! He is not here!"

A celebration of the resurrection will bring our faith to life again! The choir will lead our rejoicing, and the congregation will join Joan Morton as she re-affirms her baptism. We will share a celebration Holy Communion. Rev Sue Ellis will bring the Easter Sunday message.
