



#### **ANZAC DAY**

The sender of this postcard on 14th December 1914 was Sgt Roy Latta, a relative of my husband's family. He writes a quick card having just arrived in Egypt having departed Albany with some of the first Australians sent to the Great War, "My dear Mother...", and after a few scribbled lines to catch the post, promises to write again when he was settled. His war record says he survived the Anzac landing on 25th April 1915, fought at Poiziers and was eventually killed on the battlefield at



Bourse, France on April 6th, 1917.

So many letters and cards like this keep memories alive of loved ones lost and the terrible cost of war. In Psalm 78, the psalmist speaks the story of the deliverance of God's people from slavery and oppression. He says, "We will not hide these truths from our children but will tell the next generation about the glorious deeds of the Lord." Anzac Day is unique, says defence chaplain Rev Tim Hodgson. 'On Anzac Day we do not celebrate or glorify war. Instead, Anzac Day is about remembering those Australian s who lost their lives and made the ultimate sacrifice so that we can have freedom today, to live our lives as we choose." Roy Latta attended Clayton Congregational Church, where he was a Sunday

school teacher and where he was remembered for his "singularly happy disposition and universally liked." Roy was buried where he was slain, and his grave lost to shelling and now "known only to God". May he rest in peace. Rev Sue Ellis

## NOTES FROM CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING 20th April, 2021

- Dianne Peberdy welcomed all to the meeting, especially our new members, Angela Zhang, Kong Leong and Murray Thompson.
- Gloria Booker led devotions. We were each given a sprig of Lavender (calming), Rosemary (remembrance) Olive (peace) and she spoke of the symbolism of each of these in detail. She had also made us each a red poppy for remembrance. This was followed by prayer.
- Sue reminded us of the Uniting Church Polity giving the detail of the role of Church Council reminding us that Christ is the head of the Church.
- Officers were elected as follows:

- Following discussion, it was agreed that a small committee will begin the process of looking for a suitable rental property for Rev Richard Telfer. This committee will consult with members of the Congregation who may have some contacts in this area.
- As the Budget has a deficit this year we will need to look at where we can make changes and increase income. We will also consult with the Finance Committee.
- As we can now have up to 75% capacity in the worship space, three pews will be placed back in the church and chairs can be grouped differently. Under our new COVID Plan we can accommodate 150 in the church and 78 in the foyer.
- Sue reported that Easter Services were well attended and congratulated and thanked all those people involved in planning and preparation to bring alive Lent and Easter.

**Maundy Thursday** – a meaningful remembrance of Jesus' last evening with his disciples. **Good Friday** – a memorable service when Rev Tony Eldridge preached on our response to the Cross of a Hope-filled Hush. Many people found this to be a most meaningful service.

**Easter Sunday** – a fabulous celebration with many visitors.

- The Heart of Highgate art project has taken great shape and will remain in place until Pentecost.
- It was a joy to watch the ordination of Rev Richard Telfer at Darwin Memorial UCA.
- The first of the Study Group looking at A Voice from the Wilderness a study of the Statement from the Heart was held last night with 11 participants and 4 apologies.
- **Pastoral Partners** continue to offer outstanding pastoral care to our community. We have planned ahead for more Pastoral Partner education evenings.
- Noted and approved that there will be a Baptism during the Service on 16<sup>th</sup> May Caleb Browning-Dey born 21<sup>st</sup> August 2020 at Royal Brisbane Hospital. The family are planning to return to Adelaide.
- **Induction of Rev Richard Telfer** will be performed by The Presbytery of Southern SA most probably on a night during the week before his first service on 4<sup>th</sup> July.
- We will be celebrating **the 110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary** of the opening of the Rosefield Methodist Church on this property on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> May.
- As Sue completes her time with us at the end of May, **Preachers for June** have now been organised.
- The final Financial Reports for March 2021, were accepted...
- Bob continues to work on the requirements from the Synod Property Services Report.
- Bob reported that the floor in Rooms 1-3 has now been repaired.
- Having further issues with tree root damage to sewerage pipes. Needed the services of the plumber again this week.
- Thanks to the generosity of the Rosefield Community, the WOW Group are taking a large supply of goods and cash donations to Foodbank tomorrow.
- The meeting closed at 9.30 pm.

# Led By Faith: Rising from the Ashes of the Rwandan Genocide/Immaculee Ilibagiza

For three months in the spring of 1994, the African nation of Rwanda descended into one of the most vicious and bloody genocides the world has ever seen. Immaculée Ilibagiza, a young university student, miraculously survived the savage killing spree that left most of her family, friends, and a million of her fellow citizens dead. Immaculée's remarkable story of survival was documented in her first book, Left to Tell: Discovering God Amidst the Rwandan Holocaust. In Led By Faith, Immaculée takes us with her as her remarkable journey continues. Through her simple and eloquent voice, we experience her hardships and heartache as she struggles to survive and to find meaning and purpose in the aftermath



of the holocaust. It is the story of a naïve and vulnerable young woman, orphaned and alone, navigating through a bleak and dangerously hostile world with only an abiding faith in God to guide and protect her. Immaculée fends off sinister new predators, seeks out and comforts scores of children orphaned by the genocide, and searches for love and companionship in a land where hatred still flourishes. Then, fearing again for her safety as Rwanda's war-crime trials begin, Immaculée flees to America to begin a new chapter of her life as a refugee and immigrant—a stranger in a strange land. With the same courage and faith in God that led her through the darkness of genocide, Immaculée discovers a new life that was beyond her wildest dreams as a small girl in a tiny village in one of Africa's poorest countries. It is in the United States, her adopted country, where Immaculée can finally look back at all that has happened to her and truly understand why God spared her life . . . so that she would be left to tell her story to the world.
